




quality parks popping up eveywhere.



've never seen it crowded.








this time of year it is full of snow. The rest of the park was fun but the concrete was a bit rougher than the pool.






amount of space wisely. Funky transitions, small, medium and large bowls and no bullshit.

It took us too long to find the park in Hampton Beach. We found the park as the sun was setting. I pulled the car up to the ramp and







#### **DITCHES AND POOLS**



The thrill of skating a pool or ditch is unique. Neither were built for skateboarding. Both were built for water. Kinks and transitions you never expect will put you on your ass.












"Boy Video" By Faye Lynn



ever get the chance to visit New England go to these parks and go in the summer.








## Help Stop A Step Backwards in New Mexico Arts Education

On January 7, 2004, the Albuquerque Journal reported that Gov. Bill Richardson is proposing to eliminate state financing for the Fine Arts Education Act passed by the Legislature in 2003. Last year this bill gave New Mexico schools \$4 million to help pay for fine arts education in our elementary schools. This has had a positive impact on 80,000 students in about two-dozen schools. The original plan was to increase the funding to \$8 million in 2004 in order to reach more students in more schools. Rather than follow the original plan and increase this funding, the governor's budget recommendation eliminates this program because it takes resources away from "basic educational needs."

Please take time to make your voice heard on this important issue. Arts education is a basic educational need. Your input can make a difference and change this before it goes to the legislature in the next few weeks. Please share your concerns with the Governor's office (827-3000) and with Education Secretary Veronica Garcia (827-6516). Phone calls and personally written notes tend to be the most effective means of communicating with our governmental leaders and lawmakers. 


