






Concrete in the Desert





#### Phoenix Skatepark

Construida em 1998, foi a primeira skatepark publica de concreto no Arizona, com muito sucesso motivou a construção a c de outras pistas no Estado.



the underground music scene. I am glad that I have a stage to release all my emotions.

CIO- When were you first affected by Rock 'n Roll?

I would have to say the first rock n' roll song I remember is "The Twist" by Chubby Checkers. I loved that song! I was really your maybe 3 or 4 years old. I would dance around the room and sing to the record at my grandmother's house. Then I remember being in my bedroom singing a Kinks' song in the mirror, pretending that I was performing for millions of people, and hoping that some of my family would come through the door and catch me and make fun of me! Also when I was little, I remember my parents have Tijuana Brass record. The cover was of a girl that was naked and covered in whipped cream. I loved that record cover! Maybe is one reason I have been infatuated with nudity (as art not sex) all my life. I thought that album cover was so cool! The next recommendation I remember was Nancy Sinatra "These Boots Were Made for Walking". That also had a really cool record cover of her with go-go boots on. She looked so tough, so sleazy in a good way! Of course I ended up covering that song in my second band when lived in Austin, Texas. But, the first rock n' roll record I ever owned was The Rolling Stones "12x5". Oh my god, the first time I a picture of The Rolling Stones and heard their music, it was all over! And I have never been the same. I did not even know that 📾 was a missing link in my life until somehow I ended up with this Rolling Stones record, and to be honest, I don't know how I ended up with it in the first place! I think my Mom must have thought they were cute and bought it for me. Maybe she even sang along front of my mirror while I was at school, pretending there were a million fans out there watching her, hoping no one would come to my room and catch her and make fun of her! Mom, if it was you who bought me my first Rolling Stones record, I sure love you for that! It changed my life. I also remember James Brown being a huge influence on me. He is so fucking cool! In my home week of Austin, Texas, there was a psychodelic garage band called Roky Ericson and the 13th Floor Elevators. They were way before the time. I was 12 years old when I first saw them and Roky also changed my life. First the hippies loved him and then when the punk made era came around, all the punks loved him. The guy was timeless. In Austin there was this blues club called Antone's. I saw all an kings! Muddy Waters, Willie Dixon, John Lee Hooker, Albert King, Freddie King, Buddy Guy, Junior Wells, Bobby Blue Bland, Lim Richard, James Brown, and on and on, I got to meet most of them. It was cool! There were the coolest local blues bands also. The was a girl from Fort Worth, Texas named Lou Ann Barton. She was gonna be moving to Austin. There were so many rumors about in All the girls in town had not even met her and already hated her because they were afraid that their boyfriends were going to water fuck her! This bad reputation made me have to become her best friend! She was the most incredible and beautiful girl I had ever She was a real woman and she could sing the blues better than any white girl that I had ever seen. We used to drive around and Rolling Stone's songs and Jimmy Cliff songs off of the album "The Harder They Come". It was a blast! She told me I had a great and that I should become a singer. I was so touched! My favorite singer told me a was a good singer! But, I was still way too

Well, then Punk Rock came along. Yeah! Exactly where I needed to be! The blues were cool, but punk the void! My destructive, I don't give a fuck attitude was finally comfortable again. I finally got in a band with lot of punk rock cover songs but then we started writing originals too. The name of the band was The Other General It lasted about a year I think.

When I was about 15, my best friend talked me in to talking my parents in to buying me an electric guitar. It brother gave me lessons but it was too much work for me. She just thought it would be cool because there were any girls playing guitar at that time. It would have been cool, but I have never been a natural at playing an imment. Last year I finally broke down and started playing and writing my own songs on guitar, but of course only dire necessity did that happen and I am glad that I finally got cornered in to it. It makes writing songs a lot easier for

As far as my family affecting me with Rock & Roll...well, my brothers listened to rock also but at a certain age we all panned out different taste. I don't think they were ever really into punk and they thought I was a little crazy because they felt punk was violent and well my parents just tried to ignore the whole thing and thought I would grow out of it. I was drinking and doing a lot of drugs too and my pudd not want to deal with that either. So when I started my own punk band, my family laughed at me and made fun of me, especially my lated him for that. But my defiance of "I'll show him! Fuck him!" paid off. I told my family they sucked and thanks a lot for the supplications. When I had my second band in Austin, I asked my parents to come to the show, kind of daring them! They actually showed up my set was already over, thank god! I was pretty lude that night and was glad they did not see it because I did not want to hear about it

It's funny because now that I have been singing in bands for so many years, my parents are really proud of me. Whence my band plays in Austin for the SXSW music conference or when we are on tour there, they have a bar-b-que for my band come to see the shows. I tell the audience that my mom taught me everything I know and I proceed to take my shirt off exposithe legendery TxT tape I have across my nipples. My dad hates it when I do that! So I make sure I embarrass him yet he is proud of me and my parents are very supportive now. It must be hard to have a daughter that takes her clothes off (even though don't show my tits as much anymore because now people expect it so it's no fun for me) and that names her CD "Eat Shit + II" I was at my younger brother's house this last January for my parent's 50th wedding anniversary. He had a whole wall dedicated me with posters and pictures of me! It was so touching. Both of my brothers have been there for me and I am very fortunate to be them...and my parents too. I am glad we worked out our differences before, well you know, before someone died and it would be late.history has been preserved. The owner of the club was so cool. I, along with everyone else, got away with a lot of shit at that cited Punk was fresh, the bands were great. My favorite punk rock bands at that time were The Dicks, The Next, The Inserts, The Reaction Sharon Tate's Baby, The Droogs, The Big Boys (well, Chris Gates and I never got along but I loved Biscuit and Tim Kerr). The were a lot more that I can't think of off the top of my head right now. It was really cool because I was going out with the guitar place of Sharon Tate's Baby, Alin Black and I introduced him to my mom who was terrified of the Charlie Manson thing, besides Alin underage then so he was jailbait! But I loved him! We had a blast. He co-wrote the song Cave Woman (on Eat Shit + 1) with me in Austin, Texas during my punk days there. That was the first original song I ever wrote. Alin was an amazing guitar player, singer, and songwriter. He died of a Heroin overdose several years ago, I miss you Alin! A quick Raul's story...I never liked to wear underwear in fact I hate underwear with a passion, and one night for some odd reason I wore some panties. My boyfriend's band was playing and during the set I decided I just could not take having those fucking things on anymore so I went to the back of the room when the bar was to try to find someone with a knife so I could cut the motherfuckers off! That's how much I hate underwear! I made seeds a scene that no one was watching the band anymore so when my boyfriend got off stage he was really pissed off because I upstage his ass! Well, and also because I was so trashed, but whatever! I cut those mother fucking underwear off and that's all that mattered

Another cool punk rock club was Duke's Royal Coach Inn. It was located in downtown Austin history has been preserved. The owner of the club was so cool. I, along with everyone else, got away on Congress Avenue. It was a bigger club and the bigger acts would play the Everything is a little fuzzy about back then so I can't remember if Duke's opened because Aual's got closed down or what. One of my favor nights at Duke's was the night the Cramp's played. I had never seen such a cool band in my life and I thought it was funny that at the end of night they made Lux pay for the microphone because he stuck it up his ass or something! I thought Poison Ivy and the other girl in the band can't remember her name right now) were the coolest girls I had ever seen in my life! And Lux is an amazing front person to say the

Then there was the "new wave" club called Club Foot. They hosted a lot of the bigger bands also like The Stranglers, Geof Four, The Plasmatics, etc. It was a "nicer" club. I got 86'd from that club so when I would want to see a show, I would have to go with someone that the club really trusted. They would promise to keep me out of trouble. Worked every time

Well, there were a lot of other clubs and I proceeded to get 86'd from every club in town...except for one, The Continental Club. The were the coolest! Seems that the owner/manager was always at the clubs I was getting kicked out of. He told me that he thought the club were lame for kicking me out because I was not doing anything that bad and that he would never 86 me from The Continental. And even though I accidentally smashed a been bottle 2 inches from his head one night, he kept his word! He said I was pushing it, but he kept his word.

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CIO- So, how has Hollywood been treating you? You know, with your music and your acting. Moving to Hollywood was the best thing I ever did. Life if so much fun here. There is always something to do, new things, old things, just lots of things. Hard, but fun. But I love the challenge. I was a big fish in a small pond in Austin and becoming a small fish in a big pond was very frustrating at first. It took about a year to adjust, and believe me, I hated every minute of the first year! Well, I didn't hate every minute or I would have moved back to Austin. As far as the music goes, I am lacky in that I meet people very easily so when I started playing in bands out here, a lot of people came to my shows. I have always been like the class clown so entertaining is what I love and being in Hollywood makes it quite easy to have a stage to do so. And the acting seems to always tie in with the music and the music gets me jobs with the acting. The acting was always kind of on the back burner. I just did a lot of extra work in movies because it's an easy way to make money and it's fun to be on movie sets! Then I ended up getting an agent and have had some small parts in movies and have had parts in a few commercials, and it's getting better. A few years ago I got called by a fan of mine that happened to be producing a Marilyn Manson video for the song Anti-Christ Super Star that was being shot down the street from me (I live right in the middle of downtown Hollywood). They needed someone to dress up as the angle of death and carry a burning torch. Fuck yeah I wanted to do it! It was a very cool experience and I got to look really scary and I had to be very careful not to catch things on fire. It was fun hanging out with Marilyn and Pogo. Just recently I worked on a music video for a band from Chile called La Lei. I showed up to the set and the guitar player recongnized me. It turns out that his brother, Archie used to be in my band. He was the bass player that played on my record "Eat Shit". That was so cool! They had hired a girl and a guy to be naked. The boy was painted white and the girl was painted black. They needed another couple to be naked so of course I volunteered. We did not have to be covered in paint and I was happy about that. So I just had to put duct tape across my nipples and pussy. I tried to get away with putting TxT (my trademark) across my chest but they did not go for it. You can't blame a girl for trying! I have not seen the video, but I hear it is very popular. I doubt if they even show in the U. S., the U. S. has no taste with nudity as art. For years I have been on stage with tape covering my nipples so as not to get arrested here. It just felt so rock and roll to not have a shirt on, to pour water all over myself and just be up there singing my heart and brains out. I feel so confined when I have a shirt on on stage. Well, the press made such a big deal of it that when we would go on U.S. tours, there would be idiot guys there thinking it was gonna be some kind of weird porno show. Not! We would also get booked with "novelty" acts because of my nudity and these movelty acts were terrible and so was their music. It's so funny how people associate topless with "movelty" act here in the U.S. And then people began to expect me to take my shirt off and "show my tits". Not that I care about all the crazy feminist issues but I do have to say that if I were a guy mobody would make such a big deal of it, it's just another one of those stupid things. I mean come on, look at Iggy or Wendy-O. Not wearing a shirt is about rock and roll. It's a comfort thing, but yes when you are female it does get a reaction. Now that people expect it, I don't do it very often, only when I feel like it. Now I just strip down to a black bra with red tape across the front spelling out my TxT trademark. In Europe, it's a whole different story. Nudity is appreciated more as an art form. But whatever, I'm gonna do what I'm gonna do and I never know what that will be next!

CIO - You are known as a tough girl of rock and roll. Do you find this a hard role to live up to? Being known as a tough girl of rock and roll is great! I would not have it any other way. I can't stand girly girl singers. No balls! I get compared to some of the greatest front people of all time for instance Iggy, Wendy-O, Steven Tyler, Mick Jagger, Patti Smith, Joan Jett. Who could ask for more! I feel very fortunate to be so respected in the underground music scene. I am glad that I have a stage to release all my emotions. If I did that off stage, people would think I was crazy and probably lock me up, but when I am on stage, people fucking love it! I think it has made it difficult as far as getting record labels to approach me, even some of the hip indie labels. One night I was at a show and I was talking to some guy who happened to have one of these labels. He told me that he had always been kind of scared to talk to me because I was so intense on stage and that he was really suprised at how nice I was. I told him I thought that was funny because of some of the "guy" fronted bands he has on his label were just as intense if not more intense that me and what was the difference? He said that he understands intense guys better than he understands intense girls. I can't believe guys like this are actually scared of me. Things like this definitly make it harder for me to get ahead.

One of the best things for me is that I have both girl and guy fans. I have girls that come up to me at shows and tell me that their boyfriend loves my band and told them to come and see me. I have had guys come up to me and tell me that their girlfriend loves my band and told them to come and see me. One girl came up to me and said "my boyfriend loves you but that's ok with me because I love you too!". Now that's the best thing in the world, to just be loved by your fans. My fans keep me going I get up everyday thinking about rock and roll. I work my ass off for the love of performing and sometimes there are huge disappointments and I wonder why i spend all my time struggling only to run

#### CIO - How do you feel about Punk Rock?

All I have to say about punk rock is that it is a way of life. Some people just go through their rebellious stage. Some people do it because it is "hip" and fun, especially here in Hollywood. The term is used so loosely these days. It used to have a pretty dangerous feel to it. Now it's fashionably safe. I am happy that a lot of the original punk bands like the Buzzcocks, Damned, the Addicts etc. still tour so that their music stays alive for this generation of kids to be influenced by. I am glad that Iggy still tours. The world needs to keep legends like this available, he is the real thing! I consider him one of the original punks along with The Dead Boys, The New York Dolls, Johnny Thunders, Jayne/Wayne County, Alice Cooper etc. All of these people were punk before there was even the term punk. These are some more of my basic influences. And Marianne Faithful was definitly a role model for me. She is an amazing woman.

CIO - How many different colors have you had your hair? What do you have to say about makeup and the clothes you wear? How many tattoos do you have? Piercings? When I lived in Austin, I went to Beauty School and became a hairdresser or as it said on my license in Texas, a "Beauty Operator". I love that term! So I have had my hair about every color you could possible have. At one point, I would tell them to just point at which color on my head they wanted! But it seems that red seems to suit me the best. I just seem to have the personality of a red head. . I have had my hair fire engine red for so long that the thought of toning it down to a normal shade of red seems impossible now. I'm sure I don't get called in on a lot of acting auditions because of my hair color, especially commercials because those agency types are so afraid of being over the top. Hence my point illustrated above about punk rock. Everybody thinks it's hip, but if you are the real thing, they can't handle it unless it's something very very specific. I have about twenty tattoos. I started getting them because I love pirates! My first tattoo was a skull and cross bones. Right now my friend Robin that has a tattoo shop in Santa Cruz, CA called Love Dog Tattoos has started tattooing a really big design of a skull and cross bones surrounded by flames on my back. I am also working on a design for a pirate pin up girl with Mark Mahoney that has a tattoo shop on the Sunset Strip here called Shamrock Social Club Tattoos. I only have one piercing in my belly button. I would bet more but I am so wreckless that I am sure they would get ripped out.

CIO - What advice do you have for the kid bands about sex, drugs, and rock and roll? If you can avoid doing drugs, avoid them. I say this because it wastes a lot of time and they are very hard to quit. You don't need drugs and alcohol to be creative by the way. If you are gonna drink and do drugs, get it out of your system quick and move on, it aint worth the struggle and wasting your life over...or better yet, skateboard instead! Concerning sex, use a rubber! AIDS and other STD's are real! So is unwanted pregnancy! Have fun with it but don't let it rule your life. And about rock and roll? Go and kick some ass, put all your heart and soul in to it, I want to come to one of your shows someday!

CIO-Whatisupwithyourbandthesedays? Whatprojects do you have? What is your goal with rock and roll? We just finished recording a new record. It will be called "Your Lips...My Ass!". It was produced by Jack Douglas (Aerosmith, Cheap Trick, Alice Cooper, John Lennon, Patti Smith) and mixed by John X. Jack and John X were a blast to work with and the record sounds fucking great! Thank you Jack and John X! We had a few guest guitarist come and play including Wayne Kramer (MC5), Marc Diamond (Dwarves, Motochrist), Dave Teague (Dickies, Dimwits), Don "Demon Boy" Cilurso (ex TxT/Stiff Ones), and Ryan Roxie (Alice Cooper Band). Cherie Currie (The Runaways) came down and did a duet with me on Thin Lizzy's "The Rocker". She was loads of fun and the song sounds great! And of course my main band T-Ray Love (Bass), Jimmy "Rage" Miller (drums), and Anthony Cossa (guitar) rocked! I am talking to record labels right now about licensing so it should be released sometime soon later this year. I can't wait! My friend Cheri Lovedog wrote a screenplay about an all girl band and their struggles, a true life story. It was made in to a movie and is called "Prey for Rock and Roll". Gina Gershon plays the roll of Jacki (who is based on Cheri). In the movie, there is a scene where they come to see my band so we performed the song "Oh Yeah!" from my first cd "Eat Shit" in the movie. It will be coming out here in the U.S. in September. It has been playing at a lot of film festivals and I am very happy for my friend who wrote it and want to thank her for including us in the movie. I have also gotten our songs in several other movies that will be coming out soon. will be going to Spain to play the Serie Z Festival in Cadiz and then doing shows in Bilbao, Madrid, and Barcelona. We have a lot of fans in Spain and I am looking forward to seeing all of them once again. Barcelona is like my second home. As soon as we get a record label sorted out, we will be taking off on a U.S. and European tour. We have not been on tour for two years and I am dying to get back out there! I love L. A., but I love being on the road! I want to stay out as long as possible. Going from city to city, country to county is such a great experience. I hope that someday we will be invited to come to Brazil to play a festival. I would love it! goal for rock and roll is to keep writing songs and playing shows for as long I possibly can. And hopefully, do more acting. I love performing and can't see you all at a show soon, ok? And live by these words....

A growing trend in the skate industry, girls' skate competitions are popping up world wide giving girl skaters a venue to showcase their skills, as well as promote and push the sport. The first annual Action Girl Sports trade show founded and directed by Jamie Sparks was proud to be host to this Pro/Am competition. Big props to Jaime Sparks who pulled out her own check book to award 1st place \$1,500 and 2nd place \$500. Also a Fender guitar. ramps provided by Skatewave the event emerged from an inspiring showcase of the canceled to girl skateboarding.

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





A brief history of the GOS (Girls Skate Out):

Last year a group of girl skaters got together because they felt that there was not any real representation for female skateboarders in the UK and they were going to do something about it. They organized the first all girl competition, held at The House Skate Park in Sheffield, England. That was all it took for the "Girls Skate Out" to gain momentum. This year the event was held at the newly built Epic Skate Park in Birmingham, England.


On February 22, I set off on the 120-mile journey to Birmingham. My mum's car filled to the brim with merchandise for the competition, which was donated by all of our awesome sponsors. I thought about adding a little cushion to my wallet by selling everything along the way. But, I decided against that and continued on to Birmingham. Once in Birmingham I headed to the Ibis Hotel. There I dropped off the product to the co-organizers of the "Girls Skate Out", Mark and Laura Powell. Just to give you a mental picture, let me describe Birmingham to you. For starters it has a road system known as "Spaghetti Junction". A ridiculous mass of roads intertwining with one another on different levels. The town center is seemingly all one-way streets. It's a real crazy place with nowhere to park! Once the prizes were sorted, I headed 30 miles North to stay at fellow skater Laura Crane's for the night. The next day after a nice bowl of porridge we made our way to Epic Skate Park. The first problem of the day arose when upon our arrival the banners that were supposed to be hanging were nowhere to be seen. Then we get a call from the coach driver who was bringing 30 people from London. The good news was that they were in the city, but the bad news was that the driver was completely lost. After a bit of juggling, however, banners were finally hung and the coach driver had proper directions....or so we thought. Soon girls began to arrive at the park and registration was soon under way. They had traveled from a whole rangeofplaces in the UK such as Edinburgh, Scotland and Hastings on the South Coast of England. After a few morefranticcallsfromthecoachdriver, the bus from London finally turned up, allowing the festivities to begin. First on the list of activities were lessons for the beginners. Mark and Laura did a mag nificent job. They were both very patient, teaching the girls to drop-in for the first time. I'm sure Mark enjoyed himself as he ended up with a whole entourage of women! DJ Rossco played great classics like, AC/DC and Iron Maiden. A good vibe was felt all around. Half an hour later a lady who seemed fairly familiar asked to sign in. There was a sudden realization that it was Sue Hazel. Sue, who is now 43-years-old, started skating in 1977. In the 80's Sue entered the English Skateboarding Association. She competed in a variety of different disciplines such as bowl, high jump, speed, slalom and vert. Street competition hadn't been an organized category back then or she would have competed in that too. As part of the British team she skated all over the world. It turned out that she drove to Birmingham the night before and spent the night in her car just to participate in the 2nd Annual "Girls Skate Out". After getting padded up, Sue headed straight for the vert ramp. Despite the fact she hadn[1]t kated in six months, it was really impressive to watch her drop-in straight into a frontside air then eggplant. This is a skater who still uses rails on her board to slide!

At 2:00pm it was time for the competition to begin. It was decided to run each heat in a jam session format instead of single runs. Since a lot of the girls hadn\(\text{lt}\) competed before, a jam session forma would be a lot less nerve racking. The \(\text{U}\) inder 18\(\text{l}\) street division was first up. Fifteen-year-old, Sadie kicked off her campaign with a backside boardslide on the rail. She pulled off frontside and backside grinds on the grind block, interspersed with frontside flips, kick flips and nollie flips. Flo, a local ripper, aggressively carved her way around the park. I tell you this is one menacing looking grom who you wouldn\( \text{like to meet on a dark night. She was attempting nollie shuvits on the steep bank, but unfortunately slammed every try. Nine-year-old, Robyn should have won the prize for the most enthusiastic skater. She was pulling off laybacks with ease on the big quarter ramp and was nothing but smiles. Next up, was the Wover 180 street division. Laura Crane was attempting loads of gnarly stuff. Tricks like, a backside 50-50 to pop-shuvit out, 180 into 50-50 to half cab out, just to name a few. Her problem was that she had a weak ankle due to a previous skating injury. Rowena Brannon did a nice ollie to fakie on the quarter pipe. Rana known as the AC/DC lady was pulling off some wicked laybacks. Unfortunately the Dover 180 division wasn0t as well represented as the Under 180 division, but none-the-less it was fun to watch. Wrapping up the street competitions it was on to the mini-ramp. Generally a free for all, Sue Hazel clearly dominated this division. She was pulling off tricks such as finger flip sweepers, egyplants, frontside rock-n-rolls, and tail stalls to disaster. Thanks to Laura for filling me in on some of the names of her tricks. Alm too young to remember what all these old school tricks were popular. Sue mixed it up with a different set of tricks on the every run, which earned her first place. Laura and Mark Powell, and Simon then had the tough job of selecting the winners. Sadie Hollins emerged the winner in the Wnder 180 division. The Over 180 division was very close call with Rowena Brannon just nudging Laura Crane from first place. Rowenals consistent kating was what pulled her to the top. With prizes and money dished out to the winners all that was left was the product toss. Suddenly we were ambushed by a crowd of little boys. No one know where they had been hiding all this time, but mention free product and they come running. One boy who won a Gallaz t-shirt was pretty stoked despite the fact it was a bit too small for him. There was only one mishap to report. One of guys who came with the group from London to support the event decided he would give the vert ramp a try. In doing so he landed on his head and knocked himself out. Perhaps he should have left the vert skating to the ladies. After the paramedics helped out our unconscious friend it was all we could do to stop the little groms from knocking down the banners. Cheeky sods! The day had been really entertaining. It had been a good chance to catch up with old friends, as well as meet new faces. The female skateboarding scene is slowly beginning to grow in this country and we'ld like to thank all our sponsors for supporting us. 




